It's a Deaf, Deaf World

The rules are as follows:

- 1) No speech is allowed. Must be sign language, gestures, reading, and writing.
- 2) Those who are caught using speech will be placed in an ASL Zone for a period of time. While they are there, they are given ASL Handshake activities.
- 3) Warnings, signals, and emergency announcements must be heeded and followed in order to get points.

All in all, our students did outstanding, and most important of all, they had fun! It was a learning experience for many. ■

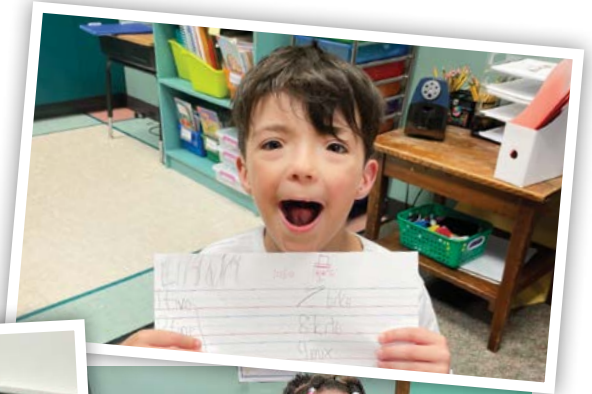

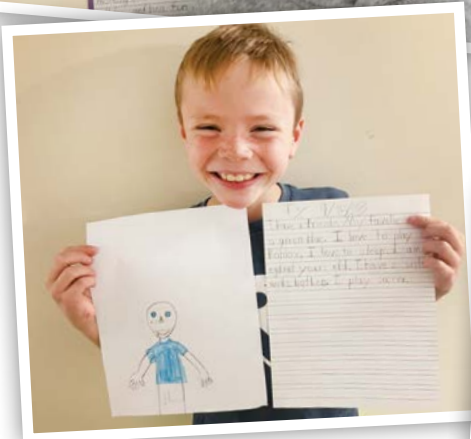

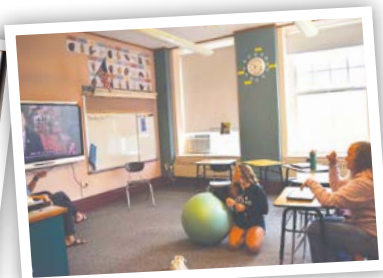
Communication is the Key to Team Success

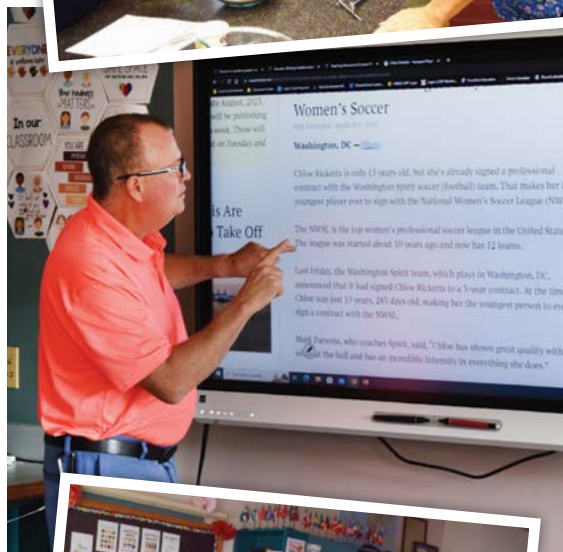
What's Happening Around Campus - High School Highlights

The Learning Never Stops at WPSD!

Ingredients for Achieving Success

During ESY this summer, high school students had the opportunity to practice their independent living skills such as working in the kitchen-- following recipes, preparing small meals, baking, and cleaning. During this particular session, the group was working together to make sugar cookies. Yum!



Chloe Ricketts Sparks Learning and Discussions in School

Some high school students in this summer's ESY program were studying and catching up on current events. The group discussed an article featuring Chloe Ricketts - the youngest player in U.S. Pro Women's Soccer. Then students took a reading comprehension quiz to make sure they fully understood the article with at least 80% or above as part of their reading goal. We also had an engaging conversation as to whether it was a good idea for someone like Chloe to start playing at a professional level at a young age - Chloe was 15 years old when she began her professional career - and how this decision may impact a young athlete's academics, growth, friendships, and family. We ended with an interesting discussion about students many years ago being introduced to playing sports for the first time. ■





Oh, Deer - Studying the Balance of an Ecosystem

The best way to learn Science is by doing, so the Environmental Science classes collaborated to experience "Oh, Deer!" This is a simulation that demonstrates the balance of nature in an ecosystem. Two rows of students lined up, facing each other. One group portrayed the deer--playing the role of being hungry, thirsty or cold. The other group stood as resources--food, water or shelter. If the deer were successful in meeting their needs, the deer reproduced--taking from the resource group. If the deer were not successful, they died, decomposed and became resources. After many rounds, the deer population exploded while there were almost no resources left. Then the predator was introduced--a wolf! As the wolf was successful in obtaining its prey (the deer), students previously as deer, became wolf cubs. After several short rounds, the deer population was gone, leaving a very large, very hungry pack of wolves.

While it was a simple game that focused on basic tenets of how an ecosystem functions, huge concepts discussed in the classroom were now palpable thanks to the effect of experiential learning. Through these simple actions, students incorporated higher-level thinking skills, synthesizing data and information from not only what was acquired in the classroom, but drawing on their own background knowledge. Raw data was converted into graphs, interpreting the graphs led to in-depth discussions utilizing scientific terminology, questions sparked debate among peers regarding hunting laws and practices, scientific study of ecosystems, biospheres and communities at the local, national and international level, and what has happened to different populations over time and what role humans play in the whole scheme. All in just 82 minutes! ■



Effective Communication is Necessary for 'Personal Development'

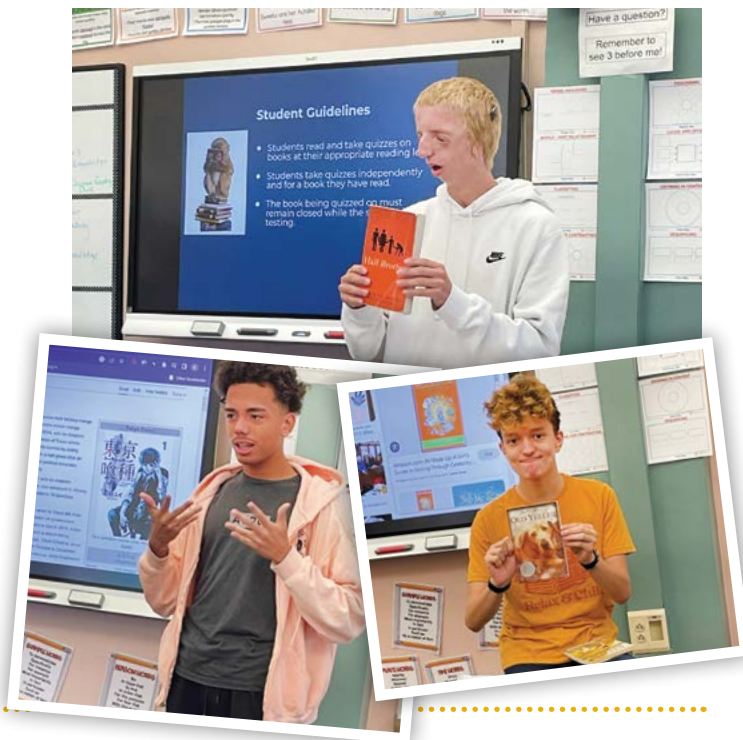

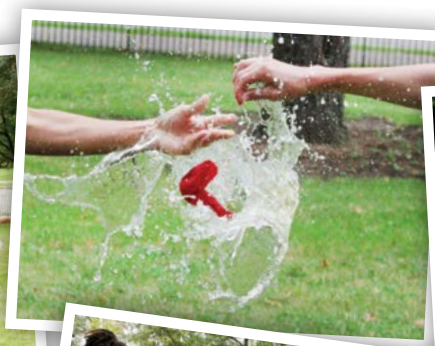

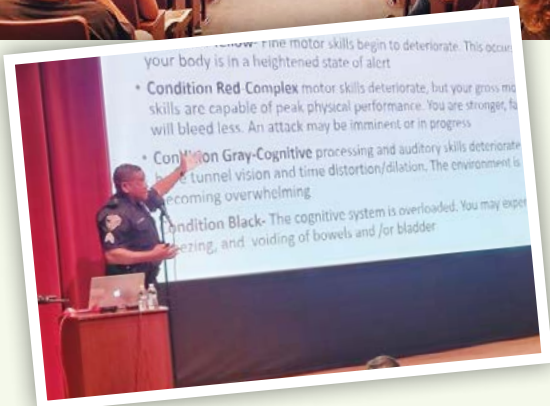
Joining Our Community in Celebration

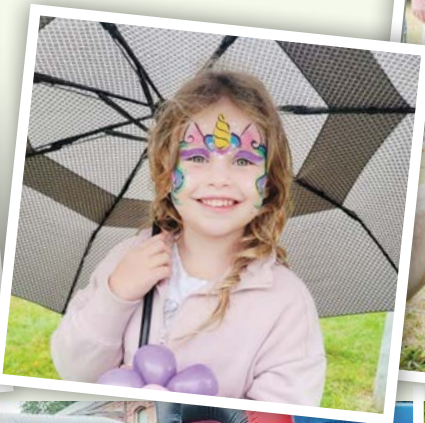

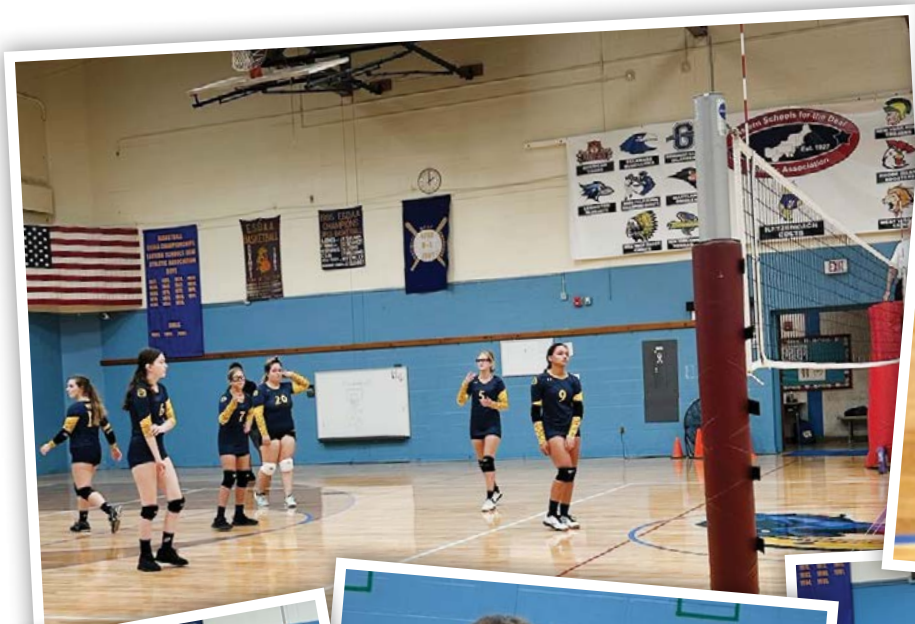


WPSD Volleyball Team Gives Their All in ESDAA Tournament

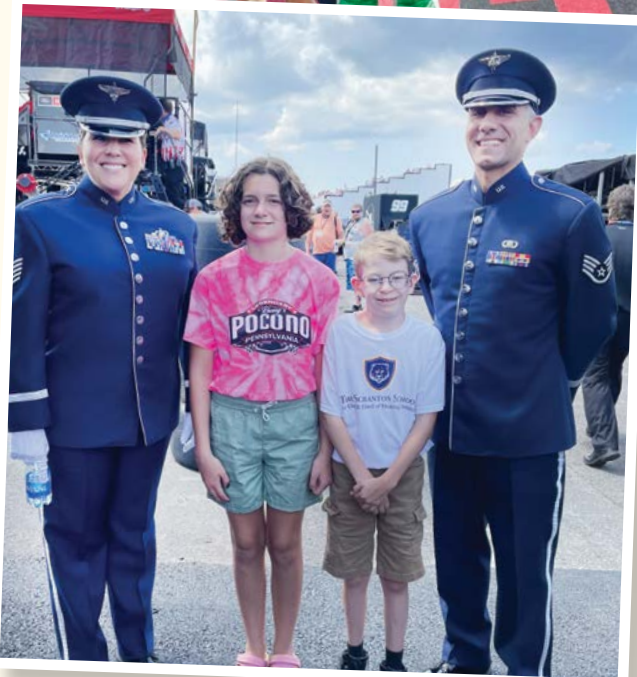
